We are back on the SXU campus for Fall classes! We will also offer a class via Zoom and a book club.

Membership Enrollment will be available **September 19 thru September 26**. We will be emailing you a **link** to our **New Membership Enrollment System. It will also be available on our website**

https://www.renaissancechgo.org.

Every member must have access to email. No information or materials will be mailed.

The membership enrollment fee for the entire year is \$180. This new system is different but improved. You will initially need to set up a new one-time Renaissance Membership account. Establishing an account means picking a username and password (make it easy to remember and/or make a note of it). Once you have an account you will not have to re-enter your personal data every time you register for classes in the future.

After setting up your account and charging a onetime annual membership fee payment to your credit card, you will proceed to Online Course Registration. For your convenience, each course description will be included on the Course Registration form.

The fee includes: classes for **all three terms**, Christmas and Spring luncheons, use of the Shannon Center track on Tuesdays and Thursdays, Renaissance Forum and the opportunity to audit an SXU class with consent of professor.

While participating in our various programs, you may be included in photos and/or videos. These photographs and videos are used in a variety of publications and advertising materials. By registering for our programs, participants consent to the use of these photos and videos.



This class will show the part the conductor and musicians play in the Symphony Orchestra. The course starts first with the role of the Conductor. Using videos, we will hear from famous conductors regarding what they feel a conductor does for the orchestra and experience them in rehearsal. Each of the following weeks will look at the various sections of the orchestra, the instruments in those sections, how they are played and listen to those sections for their sound when played without the rest of the orchestra. The use of the instruments is demonstrated by members of The Philharmonic Orchestra in London. Via videos we will visit various factories to see how musical instruments are made.



Reading the Constitution with a focus on current issues and controversies might help us answer that question. During this term, we will explore the Constitution paying particular attention to such issues as separation of powers, state-federal relations, and civil liberties and rights, and we will consider how this helps us understand contemporary issues including taxes and tariffs, redistricting and voting, freedom of religion and of the press, and immigration among others.

Hummingbirds are the only birds that fly forward, backward, sideways and upside down! These are the tiniest of birds and may travel great distances during migration. Banding of a Rufous Hummingbird revealed that it had migrated from Florida to Alaska - about 3,500 miles. There are more than 320 different species of hummingbirds and they are only found in North and South America

This course will discuss

- What is a hummingbird?
- How are hummingbirds like and unlike other birds?
- What are the elements of a hummingbird's life cycle?
- Where and when do they migrate?
- How to attract and enjoy hummingbirds?
- The history of human's relationship to this bird in culture, in legend, the arts and popular imagination.

Our first class will feature Singin' in the Rain. This particular musical will be performed right in the Beverly area at the Morgan Park Academy Baer Auditorium on





The Daughters of Yalta - The Churchills, Roosevelts and Harrimans : A Story of Love and War by Catherine Grace Katz

The story of the "daughter diplomacy" of Anna Roosevelt, Sarah Churchill, and Kathleen Harriman, three glamorous young women who accompanied their famous fathers to the Yalta Conference with Stalin in the waning days of World War II.

Tensions during the Yalta Conference

in February 1945 threatened to tear apart the wartime alliance among Franklin Roosevelt, Winston Churchill, and Joseph Stalin just as victory was close at hand. Katz uncovers the dramatic story of the three young women who were chosen by their fathers to travel with them to Yalta. Anna Roosevelt, Sarah Churchill and Kathleen Harriman were each bound by fierce family loyalty, political savvy, and intertwined romances that powerfully colored these crucial days. Situated in the political maelstrom that marked the transition to a post-war world, their relationships were tested and strengthened by the history they witnessed and the future they crafted together.
