Zentangle: Meditative Drawing for Stress Relief Mary Ellen Ziegler

Had enough?

Need to take a break from "stuff?"

Join us once a week for drawing exercises that combine repetitive motions and meditation techniques to engage us completely. Design activities like Zentangle demand rapid



shifting in the brain between right and left that promotes concentration and creativity. Unlike doodling, your movement is not random so that, hopefully, you're involved enough to experience "flow."



The designs are "non-objective," i.e., we won't try to draw realistic subject matter. That eliminates the stress of being correct! Instead, you will follow step-by-step instructions that require concentration and calm. The exercises

use repetition, symmetry and organization to design the space. Our brains like this, so you won't worry about results as you engage in the process. As time allows, we can play with color too.

Drexel University study found "that for the majority of people, making art for as little as 45 minutes a day reduces the stress hormone cortisol, no matter your skill level or experience" - Your Brain On Art by Susan Magsamen & Ivy Ross.

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

George Orwell: Part II Mike Yeager – Mike Young



This is Part II of the Great Courses series on *George Orwell* led by Professor Michael Shelden, PhD, from Indiana State University.

The purpose of this course is to understand how George Orwell rose from provincial obscurity to become the most influential British author of the last 100 years. With uncanny foresight Orwell warned against so many of the ills plaguing modern life,

especially the rise of the surveillance state, tyranny of group-think, the clever lies of propaganda, and the pursuit of power for its own sake.

Class members may want to read Orwell's novel **1984**, the source of the term, *Orwellian*. It will be the focus of spring quarter. And, if you want to catch up, **Animal Farm** was discussed in Winter term.

4. The Mysteries of Human Behavior Maureen Connolly

The DVD program chosen for the spring session is a continuation of the presentation from the Great Courses Program UNDERSTANDING THE MYSTERIES OF HUMAN BEHAVIOR. We will continue to listen to and examine some of the particularly puzzling aspects of human nature---features of people's thoughts, emotions and behaviors that have intrigued scientists and laypeople

alike. Relying on the latest theories and research from psychology, neuroscience, and other behavioral sciences, each lecture, in this course, addresses a provocative question about human behavior. The six lectures we will discuss during the winter session are:



- Why Don't Adolescents Behave Like Adults?
- How Much Do Men and Women Really Differ?
- Why Are Prejudice and Conflict So Common?
- Why Do People Fall in and Out of Love?
- What Makes Relationships Succeed or Fail?
- A Few Mysteries We Can't Explain Yet.

Professor Mark Leary, a Family Professor of Psychology and Neuroscience at Duke University, will present this series of lectures. Professor Leary is the author of a dozen books on social motivation, emotion and ego. He is among the world's top social and personality psychologists.

Prior attendance from previous terms is not required because each Video is complete on its own.



5. Al and You: A Practical Guide Pat Schultz

Are you worried about what AI can do or will do? Or are the stories

boring to you? Do you assume that you won't use it? Did you know that you're already using it? Are you curious enough to try to get a handle on it?

In our spring course, we'll look into how Artificial Intelligence is already integrated with our devices—our phones, tablets, iPads. How can we make use of it to save time and money? How can we use it to get information and organize our days, improve our financial planning and trip itineraries? What are some of the exciting uses in business, medicine and education right now?



We'll learn what a chatbot is and what it can do. The course will also introduce some useful tools like *Google's NotebookLM*, *Illuminate* and *Napkin*.

And, although the landscape of A.I. is evolving rapidly, our objective is to become well-informed and take steps toward understanding, enjoying and using this technology wisely.

The Irish Identity, Independence, History and Literature Sharon Coghlan Gerc – Madonna Murphy

We complete the Ireland series this term with the final stops in our journey to Ireland. Dr. Marc Conner, narrator from The Great Courses, will focus on the final destinations in our course, *Irish Identity Independence, History, and*



Literature during the spring term. In this final course, we will examine Irish history starting with the Dublin Lockout and World War I in Week 1. We will move on to Michael Collins and the War of Independence and The Irish Civil War in Week 2 followed by a look at *Ulysses: A Greek Epic* in an Irish World and Sean O'Casey's *Dublin Trilogy* in Week 3. As we move on into Week 4, we will learn about the Blasket Island Storytellers and *Finnegans Wake*: Joyce's Final Epic. The final two weeks will cover Patrick Kavanagh: After the Renaissance and Modern Ireland in Paint and Glass. The final week we go to De Valera's Ireland in the 1930's with the final lesson being from Seamus Heaney's Poetry of Remembrance.


Each 30-minute tour includes beautiful scenery and historical information about the Irish identity and the impact on its independence, role in history, literature and art. Those who have traveled to Ireland are encouraged to share their experiences as we watch and learn about Ireland together.

The musical has enthralled. enchanted, and enraptured audiences for more than 100 We will discover vears. what together is the quintessential American art form: the Musical. Using the many reference books that are dedicated to the art form, I will profile some of the biggest, most influential, and


most fascinating musicals ever produced. The men and women who shaped musical history - such as Stephen Sondheim, Andrew Lloyd Weber, Richard Rodgers, Oscar Hammerstein II. All are celebrated for their groundbreaking work.

The beauty of technology will allow me to share clips and photographs that illustrate the stunning designs of the shows profiled. Reference materials available from the library will be the ultimate guide to Broadway shows, filled with insider knowledge.

Theater fans will appreciate the fantastic Broadway trivia shared as well as the palpable sense of history of some America's most beloved pastimes. A handful of the shows will be featured in the Spring

Session. One of special interest is *Gypsy*! The Beverly Theatre Guild is presenting this timeless classic the first weekend in May and

there will be at least one class that will include talent involved in this production. The list of musicals is extensive. Which one is your favorite: *Annie*, *Bye Bye Birdie*, *Fiddler on the Roof*, *Grease*, *Guys and Dolls*, *Hello Dolly*, *Kiss Me Kate*, *Les Miserables*, *The Music Man*, *My Fair Lady*, *West Side Story*, *The Phantom of the Opera*, *Rent*? We will start with *The Sound of Music*!



8. Wonderful World of Warblers Mike Hastings

There are 115 species of wood warblers living between North, Central and South America and the Caribbean - 56 species are found in the United States and Canada with 19 breeding in Illinois.



In the spring, the Mississippi flyway funnels millions of these

birds toward their breeding grounds in Canada and Alaska. Chicagoland is a major stop-over, where warblers rest and refuel. They arrive at night preparing to stir the tree-tops on a dawn in May with hundreds of flashes of yellow, orange and green. Such a spectacle is not commonly seen.



This course will help make warblers more accessible. We will examine their migration routes- some warblers endure a 1700 mile non-stop over the ocean from South America to New England. Also, we will consider some of their odd behaviors - one warbler survives winter by eating poison berries!

As well we will look at their unusual habitats

- a Michigan bird only eats the seeds of young growth Jackpines. Finally, we will learn how to spot and identify warblers in your own backyard!

A Sunny Morning / A Playwriting Workshop Betty Kort

The play *A Sunny Morning* was written in the early 1900's. It is a very sweet and funny one act play, set in a park in Madrid. Since the play is in the public domain, we can make changes without violating copyright laws. This class will be a collaboration of all our ideas. The object of the class: adapt the play, change the setting and characters to tell the story from an Irish perspective.

Here are some of the ways we will adapt this play to have an Irish theme: Setting and Atmosphere, Dialogue and Language, and the easiest will be to change the names of the characters. We will also find ways to insert Cultural References and identify appropriate props and costumes to reflect Irish culture. Once we are happy with our finished product, we will find some actors to present it. I have the perfect venue for this production: Irish Fest at Gaelic Park in late August, 2025. Each year the theater group Gaelic Park Players sponsors the Performing Arts Stage at Irish Fest. We will all be named co-producers! My friend Phyllis Bierdz has experience

writing plays (she is a published author) and she has agreed to help us in this creative writing process.

This class will be held on Zoom, Mondays at 11:00AM, starting on Monday, April 14. Once I get the names of the people interested in this project and enrolled in the class, I will send you a copy of the original play.

You may want to share why this poem is meaningful to you. You may want to read it, sing it, or recite it from memory. Anything goes!



"...learn from your mistakes, be fearless and above all, have fun."



While Julia Child's advice intended for cooking, it also pertains to how she lived her life outside of the kitchen. My Life in France, begins with Julia arriving in France in 1948 (at age 32) charging Cordon win ahead to certification, joining Simone Beck and Louisette Bertholle in their struggle to complete Master the Art of French Cooking and propelled by a new media, television, to star in "the French Chef"

This memoir shows how an enthusiastic young woman grew into an American icon. A read that will both wet your appetite, for a slice of a Charolette Russe, and a sip of champagne and will satisfy the soul for being in touch with a life well lived.
