A World on the Wing - Spring Migration Mike Hastings



Return and renewal are the major tasks for birds during this most important season. Spring migration jumpstarts a bird's annual life cycle.

Billions of birds leave their wintering grounds of South America, Central America and the Gulf coast each February and March. They arrive on their

northern breeding grounds just in time to feed on nectar, insects and fish. Thus strengthened they begin to establish territory, look for a mate, build nests, incubate eggs and care for hatchlings.

In this course, we examine these events as acted out by Sandhill Cranes, Ruby Throated Hummingbirds, Warblers, Yellow-bellied Sapsucker and a variety of birds of the Midwest.

The topic of Women Aviators and their history has led us beyond the 20th Century. Let's keep going, discovering who are these women who find themselves launched into space?



Did you know Peggy set the record on September 2, 2017 for most **cumulative days** living and working in space by a NASA astronaut at 665 days? Peggy's longest consecutive time in Space was 289 days. In 2020 another woman, Christina Koch completed a record setting 328 consecutive days on the International Space Station. We will find out more about these women and many others who lead amazing lives as astronauts, scientists, and engineering specialists in the Aerospace industry.

10. Native Art of North America Sue Wrzesinski

This course will explore the cultures and arts of native American nations. Our typical image is of a Plains warrior on horseback with a full feather headdress chasing buffalo and bringing food back to a teepee encampment. But, that's a gross generalization of the Pre-Columbian peoples of our vast continent. As in the early U.S. and Europe, social hierarchies, religious expression and cultural and physical demands drove the creation of art.

Environments affected cultures and available materials. So, life differed greatly from the Eastern Woodlands and Southeast, the Great Plains and Southwest, the Great Basin and the Plateau and Northwest coast up to the Arctic and sub-Arctic. Fossilized footprints show that humans were in New Mexico about 23,000 years ago! We'll enjoy Navajo weaving and sandpainting, Mississippi Mound architecture, California woven basketry, Inuit sculpture, Pueblo pottery, the totem poles and carved masks of the Northwest coast, quillwork of the Eastern Woodlands and, of course, the beadwork of the Great Plains tribes.
