Law for the Layman Jay Gyarmathy

This course will cover a variety of topics such as the origins of the law and substantive topics like probate, wills, contracts, domestic and criminal law.

Procedural law will be addressed by looking at the factors a lawyer analyses before representing a client and exploring the anatomy of a lawsuit.

Warning! The course is not a substitute for getting legal counsel for a specific legal issue but will be helpful in understanding legal jargon and how a legal matter is resolved.



2. History's Greatest Voyages of Exploration Part II

This course is based on the Great Courses/Wondrium program. Starting with some examples of our "genetic wanderlust", Professor



Vejas Gabriel Liulevicius examines the motivations and skills of ancient explorers and the expansion of humans worldwide.

Over the following weeks, each half hour film will look at the travels of specific adventurers and the driving forces that set them on their path.

We will travel through the medieval Muslim world, explore the South Atlantic and Indian Oceans with the Portuguese, sail to the New World with Columbus

and circumnavigate the Earth with Magellan.

Back on land, we'll conquer and plunder South and Central America with the Conquistadors and finish by sailing into North Americas frozen North with Hudson.

We learn the stories of these adventurers, both successful and unsuccessful, and their consequences for history. Key themes of the course include the fact that one journey can produce a cascade of others, the range of ways unknown peoples were encountered from friendship to violence, the complicated motivations of the explorers and the common drive to discover. There should be lots to talk about!!



The DVD program chosen for the spring session is from The Great Courses. It is a set of lectures that examines some particularly puzzling of human aspects nature—features people's of thoughts, emotions, and behaviors that have intrigued scientists and laypeople alike. Relying on the latest theories and research from psychology, neuroscience, and other behavioral sciences, each lecture in this course addresses a



provocative question about human behavior.

Professor Mark Leary, a Family Professor of Psychology and Neuroscience at Duke University, will present this series of lectures. Professor Leary is the author of a dozen books on social motivation, emotion and ego. He is among the world's top social and personality psychologists and has received a Lifetime Career Award from the International Society for Self and Identity.



and traditional Irish Music and Ireland in Film and Sport. Prior attendance from last term is NOT required because each video journey is complete on its own.

Return and Renewal

"Every spring, a spectacle unfolds in the night sky and millions of birds attempt a long perilous journey between their wintering grounds and their summer breeding grounds. Most of the thousands of bird species that engage in this annual migration travel at night, when the wind currents are smoother and the moon and stars guide their way. The birds typically follow established flyways generally north-south routes that offer the best opportunities for rest and refueling along the way. Multiple bird species share these flight paths as they contend with rough weather, dehydration, starvation and the threat of predation." (P. Runwal, National Geographic, 5/5/2021)



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Six Artists You Should Know Sue Wrzesinski

For spring this year, I've selected six artists from different eras and with different styles. Alma Thomas and Hilma af Klint are women artists who have been "discovered". Hilma af Klint is considered the first abstract artist while Alma Thomas has become famous for her work done after she retired. Frida Kahlo's most important and potent subject was herself. Van Gogh, Whistler, and Wyeth all painted the real world but painted almost nothing realistically.




