Renaissance Founders Honored in Mary's Garden

When Eleanor Zaynor retired from her career as a teacher of the visually handicapped, she was determined to remain active and productive. She discovered a program for senior citizens in Baltimore which inspired her to approach the Continuing Education Department at Saint Xavier

University (College at that time) for an on campus location.

Guided by SXU and the Elderhostel organization, she created the Renaissance Chicago NFP program which began in Spring 1991. Donatta Yates was one of the 85 original charter members. She continued to participate and often facilitated until her death last year.




The original mission of lifelong learning and active involvement of all members continues 31 years later.

Virginia Wrobel Long Time Renaissance Member

So Much More than just an OCS (EP Office of Citizens' Services) Volunteer

When Virginia and her family moved to Evergreen Park in 1970, she was looking for a way to get involved in her new community. She had previously been involved with PTA, 4-H, Girl Scouts, and was a school aide at her children's

school. Unable to find a place to volunteer, she became involved with an initiative to enhance services to the senior citizens in Evergreen Park. Virginia reported that a group of local volunteers went door to door with a questionnaire inquiring about the current needs for senior citizens. Virginia was one of those volunteers. As a result of that questionnaire, the Village decided to begin a program for the seniors in Evergreen Park.

When Virginia heard they were looking for a director she threw her hat into the ring. On September 3, 1974, the Office of Citizens Services began with Virginia Wrobel as the director. Virginia stated, "I like helping people in whatever way I can." During her 50 Plus years in Evergreen she has been involved with many village groups. She talked about starting a Salvation Army Program as well as the Village Pantry in 1981. She has served on the Board of the Village Pantry, The Senior Council, and PLOWS. She is also involved with the Evergreen Park Historical Commission, The Red Hats, and a local widows group. When she finds free time she likes to read, play scrabble, and travel.

Virginia has traveled all over the world, including the Amazon, Africa, China and Japan. She has also been to all 50 states and most of Canada. She stated that her most memorable trip was "chasing gorillas in Africa." Virginia has four children, eight grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren who live all over the United States. She continues to visit them on a regular basis. In honor of Virginia's commitment to the Office of Citizens' Services and the Village of Evergreen Park, she was honored with a Dedication Ceremony on Wednesday, May 10. The Office of Citizens' Services Library (3450 W. 97th Street) dedicated the library as the "Virginia Wrobel Reading Room."
