


Daniel Webster and the Birth of American Nationalism

It frames the complexities of domestic violence through the lens of decorated Nashville Police Lt. Mark Wynn's life. He wrestles with his own violent childhood and his quest for justice in domestic violence mishandling, and cover-ups from deep within law enforcement. The film creates a compelling call to men to take the lead in reform.

The keynote speaker, Sheriff Tom Dart, has brought compassionate and thoughtful approaches to law enforcement. After the documentary, there will be a discussion by domestic violence content experts: Aileen assistant director of the Robinson, Chicago Police Department, and Itedal Shalabi, Executive Director of Arab American Family Services. Champ's Kitchen

is an on-campus food pantry located within Saint Xavier University's Warde Academic Center. It is aimed to alleviate hunger on campus so students can continue to focus on their studies and succeed in their chosen academic and career pathways. The food pantry is in **Room L-208 in the Warde Academic Center** and is open Monday through Friday, 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

Champ's Kitchen was created in response to a 2019 nationwide survey by Temple University's Hope Center, which determined 39% of students experienced food insecurity. Saint Xavier University has a high number of in-need, Pell-eligible students and Champ's Kitchen provides a way to alleviate hunger on our campus and get students the fuel they need to continue to be successful in their studies. Please consider donating! Physical donations can be dropped off at WAC (Room L-208) or in one of the marked cardboard bins around the University.

In need of the following items:

- Soups
- Canned vegetables and beans
- Ramen, rice, mac and cheese, pasta, and sauce
- Boxed meals
- Protein (canned meat, tuna, chicken, peanut butter)
- Snacks (granola, crackers, chips)

Catherine's Caring Cause

A little more than six months ago, Luz, a Venezuelan migrant, was staying in a shelter with her son, Jose, trying to figure out her next steps. Now Luz and Jose, 10, share an apartment with her sister and brother-in-law and their 5-year-old son, Thiago. Luz recently received a work permit

and is employed in a restaurant; both boys are in school.

The family is being supported by **Catherine's Caring Cause**, a non-profit created by the Chicago Mercy Justice Committee, a group of Mercy sisters and associates. The organization is working to help migrant families by finding apartments, paying the first several months' rent and utilities, and assisting them with legal services, employment, enrolling children in school, and the myriad other things that must be taken care of to start building a new life. The organization is named after Mother Catherine McAuley, founder of the Mercy Sisters.

Carol Conway, Renaissance member, Mercy associate and board member of Catherine's Caring Cause, is the mentor working with Luz and her family, who have already taken over their own utility costs as the adults have been able to find work. Luz said her family is extremely grateful for the help of **Catherine's Caring Cause** and Conway especially. "She's a wonderful person who has done so much for us," Luz said in Spanish. "We wouldn't have gotten where we are without them. I have a work permit, an immigration lawyer."

Currently, Catherine's Caring Cause is working with ten families totaling 23 children and 13 adults. The plan is to keep the caseload at ten families, Conway said, so that when a family reaches the point where it can support itself financially, it will be replaced by another family. So far, most of the families have come from Venezuela and applied for asylum when they crossed the U.S. border in Texas. Most are among the more than 36,000 migrants who have been sent north by Texas authorities with no real understanding of where they were going or the challenges they would face, Conway said. "They come with the clothes on their backs and sandals on their feet," she said. "They have no idea of the cold."

At the moment, there are nine families in apartments and two waiting for apartments, Conway said. Finding apartments has been a challenge. "We have someone who spends a lot of time looking for apartments," she said, adding that many landlords do not want to rent to migrant families.

The group has a storage room with clothing and household items and helps find legal representation to help migrants file their paperwork properly and apply for permission to work legally. The general plan is for Catherine's Caring Cause to pay full rent and utilities for six months, then half the rent and utilities for the next six months.

Organizers have found that it is not always easy, especially when unexpected problems crop up, including medical and dental issues. Rent is the organization's largest expense, making up nearly 2/3 of the \$280,000 budget. Utilities and food make up more than 40%.

The biggest needs Catherine's Caring Cause has is for volunteer mentors and monetary support, Conway said. There is no need for more clothing or furniture at the moment. Volunteers are also applying for grants and seeking financial support wherever they can find it.

Conway acknowledged that much more needs to be done, but said every small action helps. "This isn't even a drop in the bucket," she said. "It's a drop in the ocean. But it lets me sleep at night." For more information, visit *catherinecareschicago.org*.



Gaelic Park Players presents Anyone Could Rob a Bank

The Gaelic Park Players presents its spring production *Anyone Could Rob a Bank* **Fridays April 12 and 19**, **Saturdays April 13 and 20**, **at 8 p.m. and Sundays**, **April 14 and 21**, **at 3 p.m.** The play is by Thomas Coffey and is directed by seasoned actor and director Julie Zebleckis.

First produced in 1960, "Anyone Could Rob a Bank" is a spirited comedy, with a farcical, highly improbable plot. The play is set in the kitchen of Badger Grey's house and shop, in the town of Ballybawn in rural Ireland. Having read a newspaper account of a failed bank robbery in Dublin, Badger, his brother Jeeren Grey, and his next-door neighbor Windy O'Sullivan fantasize how they might conduct a successful heist. Since they had no real intention of engaging in such a crime, imagine their amazement when two days later a robbery, to the exact specifications of these masterminds, occurs at the local bank in Ballybawn. Adding to the hilarity is a further cast of exaggerated characters: Badger's hair-brained wife, Sarah; his flirtatious daughter, Noreen; Noreen's on-again, off-again boyfriend, the local police sergeant; a current house guest, Tony O'Shea; and Badger's nephew, Mickey, a wannabe champion boxer.

Theatre-only tickets are available for \$15. On Fridays and Saturdays, the Pub Dinner-Theater Combo tickets are \$35. On Sundays, the Buffet-Theater Combo tickets with buffet after the show are \$45. **Reservations are necessary.**
